Annual Planning Conference (By Scout in Charge: Ben Eversole)



American Legion B-17 Model Airplane Competition (By Scout in Charge: Bryce Fong)

On April 18, 2009 Troop 726 won first place in the B-17 diorama contest at the Oakland Aviation Museum. There were ten B-17 kits issued to various troops in the area but only 5 planes had been completed in time. The judges graded the project on 3 criteria: model skill, historical accuracy, and creativity. Model skill was based on detail, neatness, overall appearance, and decal application. Historical accuracy was judged on if the event in your diorama actually took place and if the marking and squadron numbers were correct. Creativity was based on your choice of materials, any action (battle damage) details, and overall scene details: We added simulated bullet holes and oil streaks for more realism. Our diorama was a B-17 bombing a German occupied air field in Abbeville, France. I would like to thank Kenji Pinzon and John Miles Jr. for helping me with this project. We would also like to thank the American Legion for sponsoring this event and this helped us to appreciate their historical service to our nation. We would like to thank Mr. Fong and Mr. Guerin for being the adult advisors. We look forward to participating in this event again.



The following trainings will be held:

- 1. <u>Roundtable</u> every month. Meet people and have fun learning more about scouting. Second Thursday evening of each month at the Boy Scout Center in San Leandro.
- 2. Did you complete any training lately? Please let me know. A copy of your training card would be the best. For example, University of Scouting or HAT trainings.
- 3. <u>Beginning January 2009</u>, leaders will be required to renew Youth Protection every 2 years. This is a <u>new *National Policy*</u> and is required on tour permits.
- 4.Also, <u>beginning January 2009</u>, you will be required to take a training called "Planning" and Preparing for Hazardous Weather Training." This is only available online.
- 5. Nothing new about the replacement for New Leader Essentials

If haven't take Youth Protection in the last two years you need to before you can participate in any outing or programs with our youth. You also are required by National to take the Weather Hazards course if you are a tour leader or are signing the tour permit.

U-Waste: Universal Waste, waste materials designated as containing material that needs to be disposed of in a proper manner as to not be released into the environment. (examples: Batteries, fluorescent lamps)

E-Waste: Electronic Waste, waste materials designated as defective or obsolete electronic equipment, surplus electronics. (examples: Computers, monitors, CRTS, VCRS, TVs, computer parts, mobile phones, cables, computer boards).
